Instructions to Speaker

- 1 Give the listener one of the lists of questions presented on pages 200–201. Each list contains 24 context questions which are either related to the stimulus sentence (these are written as 'Rel.' in your copy below) or contextually neutral context questions, such as 'What's happening?'
- 2 Ask the listener to read the first question on their list and reply with the response utterance ('Resp.' on the list below). The listener should repeat the utterance back as accurately as possible. It is expected that the listener will have more difficulty with the sentences following the contextually neutral questions than the prior context questions (or 'Rel.' questions).
- 3 Score the listener's progress by counting how many key words the listener identifies correctly (underlined words in the 'Resp.' sentences are the key words).
